Semivowel: Ы (i, y)

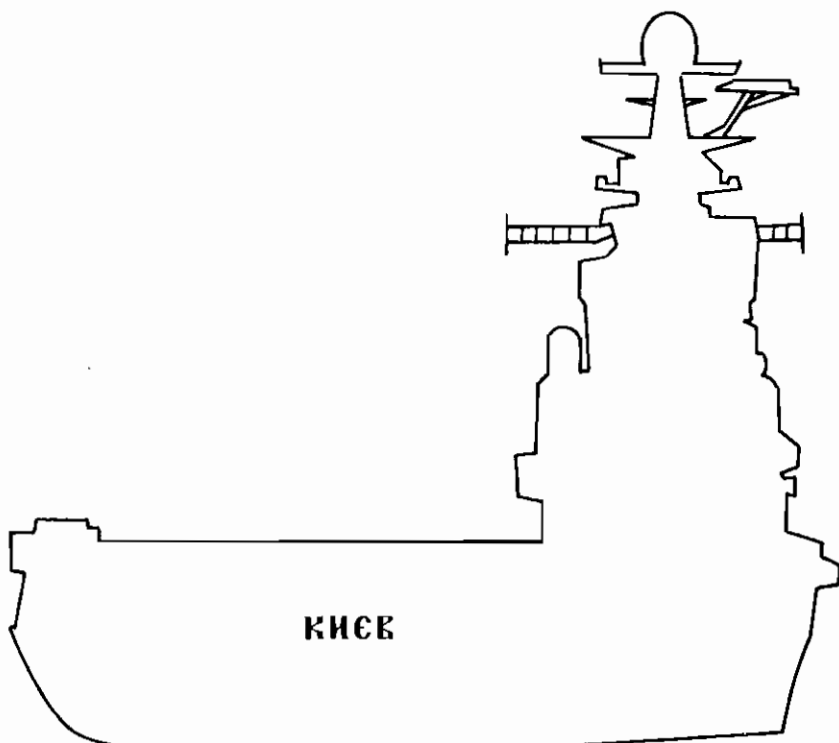
